ROBLOX - SAFETY UPDATES

Late last year, Roblox announced some major updates which are available to users and parents. The rollout has already started and will be fully implemented by March.

The safety updates include:

- Limits to how children under 13 can communicate.
- Parental controls accessible from the parent's phone rather than the child's device (remote management).
